I am honored to share the 2023-2024 New Castle County Head Start, Inc. (NCCHS) Annual Report, a reflection of our incredible impact together over the past year. Our success is made possible by the dedication of our staff and the commitment of the families we serve.

A significant achievement during the year was a successful federal review of NCCHS, evaluating program performance, progress, and adherence to federal requirements. All Head Start programs undergo periodic federal reviews to ensure compliance with performance standards. In February 2024,

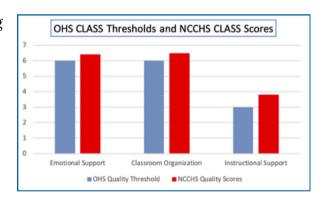

the Office of Head Start (OHS) conducted a Focus Area 2 monitoring review of NCCHS. Over a week, a team of reviewers analyzed key areas, held staff and parent interviews, and examined program data to assess overall effectiveness.

In March 2024, OHS completed a Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) evaluation, using in-class observations to assess classroom quality against federal benchmarks. As shown in the chart, NCCHS not only met but also exceeded all thresholds, showcasing our commitment to excellence in early childhood education and the ongoing dedication to continuous program improvement.

- 445 Head Start children ages 3 to 5 years
 - o 322 children in the extended-day program
 - 123 children in the year-round program
- 113 Early Head Start children ages birth to 3 years and 4 pregnant mothers
- 60 Head Start and 11 Early Head Start children with disabilities
- 84% and 100% continuous enrollment for Head Start and Early Head Start, respectively
- 97% of Head Start children and 94% of Early Head Start children received medical exams, and 85% of Head Start children and 73% of Early Head Start children received dental exams

- 34 of the Head Start staff and 2 of the Early Head Start staff are former parents



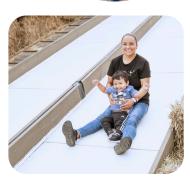

2023-2024 Accomplishments

- Welcomed 17 new employees to NCCHS.
- Completed an annual financial audit with no findings.
- 13 staff members were enrolled in degree programs.
- Received \$235,000 from the State of Delaware Quality Improvement Award, which was used to reward staff for their commitment to the children and families with retention, longevity, and staff appreciation bonuses.





- Twelve staff members earned their Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential and were promoted to Teacher Assistant—of which 8 completed 120 hours of training and 4 were accepted into the Early Childhood Innovation Center CDA coaching cohort through Delaware State University.
- Through our partnership with PolyTech High School, 13 parents completed a 14-week Training in Early Childhood Education (TECE) class. Four graduates applied and were hired for full-time roles at NCCHS.
- Continued a partnership with the Food Bank of Delaware Backpack Program providing enrolled children with take-home meals each week to ensure they have food over the weekend.
- Welcomed Impact Life at all NCCHS locations for Narcan use training for parents, who received a take-home single dose for emergencies.
- Introduced Conscious Discipline, a trauma-informed, evidence-based social-emotional curriculum to help our classroom educators strengthen connections between children and adults.
- Continued a partnership with Stand by Me and the United Way of Delaware to provide families with personalized financial coaching— 50 increased their savings, 20 improved their credit scores, and 60 enhanced their financial management skills.
- Transitioned 100% of age-eligible children, a total of 267, to kindergarten in the fall of 2024











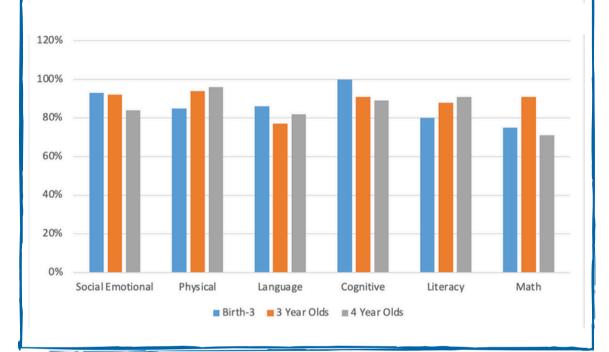




2023-2024 Outcomes

Program Review

Program Review and Self-Assessment Findings

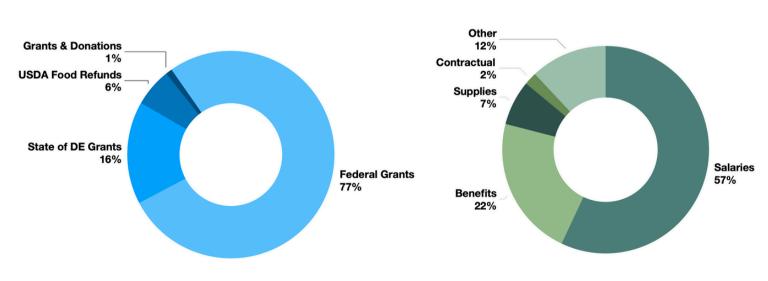
In addition to the Federal Monitoring Review in 2024, NCCHS conducted a comprehensive self-assessment in alignment with the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS). Key findings included:

- Program Design & Management: Strong oversight and leadership structure, with management team members rotating as leads in various program areas to ensure expertise across all components.
- Quality Education & Child Development: Teachers create nurturing, responsive environments that foster engagement, critical thinking, and communication. The introduction of Conscious Discipline strengthens social-emotional learning in classrooms.
- Health Program Services: Effective health monitoring, ensuring all children receive hearing and vision screenings within 45 days of enrollment. Families are connected to mobile healthcare services for comprehensive check-ups.
- Family & Community Engagement: Strong parent-child support services, including access to an online parenting curriculum that builds skills and fosters parental confidence.
- Eligibility, Recruitment & Enrollment (ERSEA): Targeted recruitment efforts ensured compliance, with no need to enroll children above 130% of the Federal Poverty Level.
- Fiscal Infrastructure: Fiscal transparency and accountability, with joint committees of the Policy Council and Board of Directors meeting monthly to monitor financial operations and budget decisions.
